





Community Effort

While Cottesloe is blest with what is said to be the finest Civic Centre in Australia, and possibly one of the finest in the world, all that it stands for can be nullified without sustained community effort.

Cultural activities have certainly appealed to ratepayers, who have responded eagerly in supporting them, but what actual contribution has been made by the individual?

They have attended the lectures in their hundreds, and have been unstinted in their praise of the lectures and the artists assisting, and in most cases they have left it at that. There have, however, been keen and enthusiastic ratepayers who have become members of the local opera, but, unfortunately, their numbers have not been large.

While it is said that comparisons are odious, one is impelled to examine what is being done in other parts of the State by communities in far different settings to that of the Cottesloe Civic Centre.

For instance, a lot can be learned from the activities of the South Perth Community Centre.

In that district is established a South Perth Community Centre Association, Inc., with a Centre Leader, Deputy Leader, Centre Secretary, Centre Treasurer, "Community News" Editor, Magazine Editor and Social Editress, and all these positions are honorary, although they take up a great deal of time.

Amongst the varied activities of the South Perth Centre Association are the annual carnival, which has always been a big financial success, Social Services Exhibition, Community Centre Brass Band, Library and Leisure Centre, Children's Library, Teeners' Club, Popular Mother Contest and dances and socials to name just a few from a very long list.

And these activities are carried out by the ratepayers of South Perth; the road board does not, nor is it expected, to bear the brunt of organising. It gives advice and assists where possible, but it is entirely a ratepayers' show, and it is highly successful.

With the exception of the Civic Centre Annual Fete the numerous associations affiliated with the

Civic Centre have failed to take advantage of the possibilities offering, with one or two exceptions.

The North Cottesloe Surf Life Saving Club has shown the most initiative, having organised two mannequin parades, and besides giving first-rate entertainment to ratepayers, has considerably augmented its funds.

What can be done by one association can be done by others, and it should not be left to the Cottesloe Council to inaugurate functions of this nature.

Tremendous effort and energy has been put into certain cultural activities, particularly the opera "Orpheus," but the effort has been made by a few.

We have already written on the great effort of the Children's Library Sub-Committee. The people of Cottesloe have shown in the past that they are the equal of any community in public spirit. They have enjoyed and supported the Civic Centre; now let them prove they can run a Community Centre that will be second to none in the State.

“OLD COTTESLOE”

(A series of articles on the Early Days of Cottesloe by T.R.V.)

No. 2.—FINANCES OF FIFTY YEARS AGO.

Considering the colossal cost of constructing roads and footpaths today, it is interesting to recall the expenditure on these necessary works 50 years ago.

In 1901 the following road construction was carried out by the Cottesloe District Road Board:—Swanbourne Terrace, £43/4/-; Jarrad Street, £65/15/6; Dean Street, £102/5/-; Warton Street, £212/4/-; Ocean Street, £69/9/6; Broome Street, £151/17/-; John Street, £197/1/10.

Of course not in every case was this the complete cost of the road. In some cases the figures quoted above were for the completion of a road started previously, and in others the commencement of a road to be completed as funds became available.

But when it is considered what the cost of metal, bitumen (or in those days tar) was, compared with today's price, and what the roadman's wage was (there was no basic wage in those days) compared with what his counterpart received today, it will be realised what a great deal more the local authority could do with its income then than it can do today.

Maintenance for the year 1901 was not very high. A total of £90/17/8 was spent in this service, split up as follows:—Princes Street, £7/11/3; Forrest Street, £15/10/9; Marmion Street, £21/0/3; Napoleon Street, 12/9; Salvardo Street, 5/-; Broome Street, 6/-; Reginald Street, £10/6/9; Burt Street, £3/13/5; Avonmore Terrace, £3/4/-; Napier Street, £21/15/-.

I wonder what work could be done today in Napoleon Street for 12/6, Salvardo Street for 5/-, or Broome Street for 6/-! It would hardly pay for an inspection by the chairman of the Beach and Works Committee.

As the Road Board was then expanding, streets had to be extended, but prior to that it was essential that the bush should be cleared away. Cost of this in 1901 is certainly interesting: Princes Street, £10; Napier Street, £9; Congdon Street, £12; Jarrad Street, £6/10/-; and Railway Street, £3/7/-.

Fortunately there is little bush to be cleared in Cottesloe today, and it is just as well at today's cost for such services.

One of the biggest items of expenditure in 1901 was for Park Fencing, etc., and this was £226/12/5. Fencing was mainly for the Oval, but what the "etc." was I cannot at this stage remember.

The construction of a public pound cost the ratepayers £46/4/-, but as this included legal advice, this certainly cannot be considered exorbitant. Today, probably the legal advice would cost more!

Total income for 1901 was £2,064/12/3, only £690/13/3 being received in rates, the balance consisting of special Government grants (Park fencing, £300; Perth-Fremantle Road repairs, £30; Ocean Road, £350; Broome Street, £150; Warton Street, £200); and income from carriage licences, £23/10/-; dog licences, £23/15/-;

deposits on contracts, £73/11/6; poundage fees, £3/6/-; and, among other items, an annual grant of £200 for maintenance and construction.

At the finish of the financial year, the Cottesloe District Road Board had a credit balance of £49/10/4, made up of a balance from the grants at the Treasury, and cash in hand and at the bank.

All this was certified as correct by W. J. Cohn for the Police Magistrate, and by A. E. Trivett for the rate-payers.

One thing stands out in going through these old figures: The Cottesloe District Road Board got a great deal more assistance from the Government than the present Municipal Council. This, of course, is quite logical, as the "baby" of 1901 is now a sturdy youngster, but I venture to suggest the "parents" of 1901 did not have the teething troubles with their Mechanics' Hall as the present Council has with its wonderful Civic Centre, and the fact that it has emerged from its first year so successfully is a tribute not only to the Council, but to the magnificent work put in by the Council staff.



COTTESLOE AMATEUR ATHLETIC CLUB

When the summer season ends in a few weeks time, our club members' thoughts will be turning to winter activities. Those who are considering their future in athletics will wisely do winter training, namely, cross-country running.

Mention cross-country running to most people and they immediately conjure up visions of people running miles and miles, performing almost herculean feats. This, however, is not true, the fact being it is much easier than the track season. For track athletes, winter training is used solely to build a foundation on which to work during the summer season. Overseas coaches are great believers in road work during winter for all track athletes, especially those in the 440yds. and upwards group. Morris Curotta, who went to America after his great run in the 1948 Olympic Games, wrote home and said that he had been racing over 5,000 metres cross-country. Curotta's best time this season is 47.6s., so he has not suffered from winter work. Apart from the physical aspect the atmosphere during cross-country running is a much more friendly one, there is not the same hustle and bustle as found on the track and the athlete has a better opportunity to know his clubmates.

Congratulations to Joe Keeling on his fine third in the Australian 440yds. championship. Joe excelled himself when he ran the illustrious Edwin Carr to a couple of yards. Good work, Joe; but what about the half-mile?

We were all sorry to see Bill De Gruchy defeated in the 100yds. It is my contention that Bill overtrained before his race in Brisbane. A sprinter, more so than any other performer, needs freshening up at least two weeks before a big race. Sprinting and jumping are explosive efforts where the athlete must be right in top gear from the outset of an event. Western Australia's doughty walker—Don Keane—did best of our representatives by winning two titles.

The State Championships are being held on the 16th and 23rd of February. It will be interesting to see how our boys fare. We look set for at least four titles: 440yds., 880yds., 440yds. hurdles and hop-step-and-jump. However, some athletes are as unpredictable as our equine parallels, which means anything can happen.

At last Cottesloe garden enthusiasts can really get together. A horticultural group has been founded at the Cottesloe Civic Centre by a small group of keen citizens. General meetings of the group will be held on the fourth Monday of each month commencing on Monday, March 24 at 8 p.m. in the South Lounge of the Civic Centre.

The aims of the group are to bring together citizens of Cottesloe and surrounding districts so that they may discuss their gardens, exhibit their choicest flowers and learn more about their plants and how to grow them from the lectures and demonstrations on gardening practice which the group has planned for its meetings.

This show should let the public see what rare and beautiful plants are grown in the district.

Come along to the general meeting on March 24 and take an active part in the planning of this show. Become a member and enjoy the series of lectures and demonstrations to be given this season. Membership fee is 3/6 per annum or 5/- for family membership. The group is particularly keen to have junior members.

The Horticultural Group is yet another of the several groups already contributing to the cultural life of our district. It needs your support and given this, will return much to its members and to visitors to the Civic Centre.

CHAMBER MUSIC

The Cottesloe Civic Centre promises to provide an ideal setting for a concert of chamber music which is to be given by the A.B.C. String Quartet under the auspices of the W.A. Chamber Music Society, on Thursday, March 20.

Chamber music has been described as "room music" or "the music of friends." It comprises music written for a group of solo instruments, intended to be heard in a room or small hall.

The group of soloists may be any number, from two to as many as thirteen. The instruments may be strings alone, strings with piano, wind alone, wind with strings; any combination that a composer may choose. The devotee of chamber music, however, looks on the quartet of strings (first and second violins, viola and cello) as the ideal combination, and with good reason, for here, to quote Sir Donald Tovey, "we have the purest and highest revelation of chamber music, and perhaps of all music."

The greatest composers—Bach, Haydn, Mozart, Beethoven, Brahms, and many others—found constant delight and refreshment, not only in writing such music, but also in joining other musicians to play in such groups.

The programme to be given will include quartets by Haydn, the "father of the string quartet" and the distinguished Hungarian composer, Dohnanyi. Lorna McKean, whose artistry is always welcome, will be heard in groups of songs, including delightful English folk-songs, with quartet accompaniment.

We hope that residents of Cottesloe will take the opportunity to support what should be an outstanding evening of music.
